From the Principal

Learning

I used to work with a colleague who would often say, in reference to schools, "it's all about the learning." In fact, he would often overuse this phrase. But he had a point. Schools are learning communities. Nhill Lutheran School is a learning community. Our primary focus is student learning. Our mission statement sums it up: "Nhill Lutheran School provides a quality education in a caring Christian environment." We aim to provide best practice learning opportunities in a place where the love of Christ is known and shown.

The beginning of a new school year is an exciting time which brings new plans and focuses. The teachers have worked hard to plan engaging learning opportunities for the students in 2021. NLS continues to explore ways to improve how we educate our students to best equip them for now and into the future.

Last year showed that the ability to adapt quickly, think differently, problem solve, use technology purposefully, and more, all helped with learning in challenging times. We want our students to be equipped with essential skills that are needed - critical and creative thinkers, collaborators, clear communicators and possess digital competency.

Our classrooms have been established with the vision of catering for the many different learning styles that exist in 21st century classrooms. We have observed numerous benefits to students and their learning with our flexible learning spaces. A University of Salford study found that furniture and features in schools that were ergonomic and comfortable for students were significantly correlated with learning progress.

This year the staffing structure at NLS has changed to include the role of Curriculum Coordinator/Specialist Teacher, a role Miss Attiwill will perform. Our aim is to strengthen the delivery of curriculum, and ensure evidence based programs are used to improve our student's learning progress. Part of Miss Attiwill's role will be to teach Technology (STEM).

Ms Greer Marshman, Miss Leah Noll and Miss Georgina Morrison were installed last Sunday at St Paul's Lutheran Church, Nhill. Other staff and students were also blessed by Pastor Carl.

Attendance at chapel and assemblies

Visitors may attend chapel and assemblies as long as we don't exceed our density quotient of 1 person per 2 metres squared. Visitors must sign in via the QR code or the sign in register, located at the front entrance, if on site for 15 minutes or more. The number of visitors allowed in chapels and assemblies will vary depending on the number of students and staff present, but will be around 25-30 permitted visitors. Please use Covid safe practices and do not attend if feeling unwell. Currently face masks must be worn when inside the school building.

There is much to look forward to this term and hopefully we are able to carry through with our plans more than we could in 2020. Next week we have the opportunity to gather as a community for a Welcome BBQ and I look forward to seeing families there. Please RSVP to the front office so we have an idea of numbers for catering. Students commence their swimming lessons on Monday February 15 and our Swimming Carnival is Friday February 26. A hockey clinic is planned for week 4, and Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday also occur in week 4. We have a visiting performance, Wadjiny, during week 6, Book Fair later in the term and more. A busy and exciting few weeks!

Devotional Thought

It's upside down!

'Looking at his disciples, he said: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God" (Luke 6:20).
Read Luke 6:20–26

The Beatitudes give us a vision of an upside-down kingdom. It's the opposite of what the world thinks is right. Jesus explains to his disciples the qualities that make a happy life. There are four blessings on people with four attributes and four woes on people with the opposite characteristics.

So why is this the opposite of what we would think life should be? The world offers short term gratification but not the eternal joy and happiness that believing in Jesus offers. Jesus boldly says that those who want to follow the world's ways will not be ultimately happy.

Jesus emphasises the central ethic of his kingdom, love, and the importance of obedience to his teachings. These blessings are to encourage his followers in the face of mounting persecution. In short, this is a message on how we should live, including the need for repentance. Jesus is encouraging his disciples (us) that God will bless them when the world hates them. Live by Christian values and not the world's values.

We shouldn't be surprised by God's upside-down approach to the way he does things. A baby born to be Saviour of the world can't even get a decent, clean room for this momentous event? That's upside down. And they all lived happily ever after? Only in heaven for those who believe in Jesus as their Lord and Saviour.

During the days leading up to school commencing, staff completed Bounce Back training. Bounce Back is a positive education approach to wellbeing, resilience and social-emotional learning used at NLS. The Bounce Back acronym outlines key messages to develop good thinking habits (a simpler acronym is used for younger students):

Bad times don't last, things will always get better – stay optimistic

Other people can help, if you ask them

Unhelpful thinking makes you feel more upset – think again

Nobody's perfect, not you and not others

Concentrate on the positives in a bad situation no matter how small

Everybody experiences sadness, hurt, failure, rejection and setbacks sometimes, not just you

Blame fairly

Accept what you can't change

Catastrophizing exaggerates your worries

Reading Buddies Program

We are currently seeking some parent helpers to assist with our reading buddies program . Reading buddies involves parent volunteers listening to students reading aloud. Volunteers must have a current Working With Children Check and complete the training that is explained below.

Volunteering at NLS

For all parents wishing to volunteer at school to help in the classroom, on camps or with other student activities this year, parents must bring the following to the front office: 1) a current Working with Children Check and; 2) a certificate of completion of one-hour Valuing Safe Community training session on-line within the past three years. As a school of the Lutheran Church of Australia (LCA), staff and volunteers are obliged to meet the requirements of the LCA Safe Place Policy. Valuing Safe Communities (VSC) is a program to comply with this expectation. This training is valid for three years.

VSC Online Training Instructions

Go to http://ilearn.alc.edu.au/course/view.php?id=170. Follow the instructions. Use the Enrolment Key: VSC3_Volunt33r to gain access to the training. On-line training takes about 30-40 minutes. Certificates of completion will be generated at the end of the session. If you need any assistance, or would like to use a school computer to complete the training, please see Mrs Koning at the front office.

Hats

Child Safety

Students across all year levels will be revising Cyber Safety and how to protect themselves online. Make the most of this school year



Positive parent participation demonstrates to children that you value learning and their school in particular. Children copy many of their parents' views so your positive attitude to school and learning is catching.

Parental withdrawal from children's education is a big problem these days as increasingly parents are worn out from working too hard or being involved in a variety of activities.

But the message for parents is clear – become involved in as many aspects as practical in your child's education.

Their chances of success are better when kids see school as an extension of home rather than merely an institution for learning.

Positive parent participation demonstrates to children that you value learning and their school in particular. Children copy many of their parents' views so your positive attitude to school and learning is catching.

Make the most of the opportunities that schools offer to assist in the classroom including, hearing kids read, taking small groups in elective activities and assisting children when writing stories.

Parent participation is much broader than helping out in the classroom. Hearing young learners read, helping with homework and making sure kids go off to school happy, healthy and with plenty of sleep are important aids to learning.

Here are some more ideas to help you participate in your child's education in positive ways:

- **1. Make sure your kids start each day well.** That means they should get a good night's sleep, have a healthy breakfast and arrive at school on time with all their learning requirements as well as a healthy lunch.
- 2. Attend school activities such as open days, concerts, parent evenings, sports events and celebrations. Read the school newsletter and other forms of communication so you can stay in the loop with what's happening at your child's school.
- **3. Consult with your child's teacher** about homework expectations and practical ways that you can assist both at home and at school. Each teacher has his or her own expectations about how you can help so make sure you work within their guidelines.


