Devotional Thought

Despite who you are

But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we

were still sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8). <u>Read Romans 5:1–11</u>

The 20th-century theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer explores the concepts of cheap grace as opposed to costly grace. What is meant by those two terms?

Maybe we need to start by asking ourselves, what actually does the term 'grace' mean? Before you read on, how would you describe it to someone? Grace is the pure mercy and forgiveness of God extended toward you as a completely free gift without any of your contribution. You see, when God extends a hand out to us, it is completely due to his love, grace and mercy. It is a free gift for us, one that we can't earn and don't even deserve.

Wouldn't you say you treat free things often not with the same respect as you treat the things you have paid a lot of money for? Expensive things seem to have a special place and we treat them with a lot of care. If something is just given to us, it often seems a bit more ... disposable. This even applies to activities, not just material items. Wouldn't you agree that if you have paid \$100 for a gym membership, you would try and get your money's worth and attend as often as you can? But when you are offered a full membership for free, you might agree to come and then think it won't hurt if you can't make it for a couple of weeks or so, because there is no loss attached to it on your end. Or so we think. Grace has been given to us freely. If we ponder on the meaning of grace for our life more often, it can help us understand how meaningful a gift it is, one not worth squandering.

Cheap grace is like saying, 'God forgives me anyway. It doesn't matter if I keep the commandments, if I bend the rules in my favour a bit or if I intentionally misbehave. God will wait for me with open arms anyway'.

Costly grace is realising how much it cost our Saviour Jesus Christ to earn this free gift for us. It cost him his life. It cost God his Son. Grace is beautiful and lovely, but it has been paid for with blood and tears. Even though it's a gift that comes at no cost to us, it cost God everything. It's not free at all. And as we start comprehending that and following intentionally the way of Jesus, we realise that, in fact, it costs us everything too. It costs us our whole life to follow Jesus. And yet God doesn't force us into submitting to him. God gives us the free choice to do it, and he sends the Holy Spirit to work within us so we can respond to him in faith, love and trust. God takes the first step toward you, while you are still a sinner. And God doesn't do that as a once-off; he does it over and over as we also turn back to him. Make today yet another new beginning as you gratefully receive the grace God showers upon you.

Heavenly Father, thank you for loving me while I am still a sinner. Help me to please you, and grant me your Holy Spirit day after day. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Get Active Kids Voucher Program

For 2021, the Victorian Government has opened up a voucher program to assist junior players with the cost of memberships, registrations, uniform and equipment. This is called the Get Active Kids Voucher Program and it provides vouchers of up to \$200. Applications are only open from Monday, 1st of March (from 10am) until Sunday, 11th of April. To take advantage of this offer, children must be aged 4 to 18 and named on a valid Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card and Medicare card. Reading Buddies Program

We are currently seeking some parent helpers to assist with our reading buddies program . Reading buddies involves parent volunteers listening to students reading aloud. Volunteers must have a current Working With Children Check and complete the training that is explained below.

Volunteering at NLS

For all parents wishing to volunteer at school to help in the classroom, on camps or with other student activities this year, parents must bring the following to the front office: 1) a current Working with Children Check and; 2) a certificate of completion of one-hour Valuing Safe Community training session on-line within the past three years. As a school of the Lutheran Church of Australia (LCA), staff and volunteers are obliged to meet the requirements of the LCA Safe Place Policy. Valuing Safe Communities (VSC) is a program to comply with this expectation. This training is valid for three years.

VSC Online Training Instructions

Go to http://ilearn.alc.edu.au/course/ view.php?id=170. Follow the instructions. Use the Enrolment Key: VSC3_Volunt33r to gain access to the training. On-line training takes about 30-40 minutes. Certificates of completion will be generated at the end of the session. If you need any assistance, or would like to use a school computer to complete the training, please see Mrs Koning at the front office.

My name is Ms Marshman and I will be teaching Performing Arts and The Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program across the school on Tuesdays and Thursdays. I have enjoyed getting to know all of the students at Nhill Lutheran School and look forward to a great year of learning together.

The students have already planted lots of seeds in the garden – we are hoping to see beetroot, silverbeet, broccoli, carrot, cauliflower and lettuce start to shoot soon. They all enjoyed making 'seed spheres' to plant at home and will delight in the surprises that may grow. In the kitchen, students experienced making muffins – hopefully some of our families have even enjoyed some baking at home using the skills that they developed!

In Performing Arts we have placed a focus on getting to know the students and on learning their interests and strengths. 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INSIGHTS That's leadership thinking!



My father used to tell me that to be a good footballer I needed to look like a footballer. He always made sure I played with my socks pulled up, boots clean and football jumper tucked in. His attitude was I should at least look the part.

Fast forward a few generations and Dad would probably tell me today that if I wanted to be a footballer I should think like a footballer. His thinking would be right because any significant skill development usually comes before a positive mindset, or at least, a mindset that captures the essence of what's required.

This mindset concept is easily applied to many areas of parenting and family life, including leadership, which is required in school, at work, in the community and in family life. Thinking like a leader comes before leadership action so attending to a child or young person's mindset lays the foundation to real leadership.

The following mindsets are good starting points for developing leadership mindsets in the next generation.

Be accountable

The mark of true leadership whether for adults or young people is the willingness to take responsibility and be accountable for your actions. Responsibility and accountability are features that great leaders share, so encourage children and young people to accept personal responsibility for their actions, learn from their mistakes and avoid making excuses when things go wrong. For this to happen parents and teachers need to forgive their mistakes and poor decisions so that they feel they can take responsibility without fear of harsh retribution.

Plan ahead

Thinking about what needs to be done, planning ahead and managing time are skills that enable many young people to become effective leaders. The ability to think ahead, strategise and figure out a plan may sound like corporate-speak but it's something that kids of all ages can accomplish. We can plant the planning seed by encouraging them to think ahead and set aside some time to plan before tackling any activity – whether it's a homework project, resolving conflict with a sibling or asking for an increase on their allowance.

Work together

The ability to form, maintain and work in teams is a central leadership capacity. Teamwork refers to a range of skills, including problem solving, working with others, listening and following that enable a team to work towards one purpose. All children are capable of working together, although introverts and pubescent teens can struggle to work collaboratively. Sow the seeds of teamwork by encouraging kids to support their siblings and friends when they struggle and to accept everyone in games and activities.

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Tune in

Emotional intelligence is an essential set of skills that unfortunately many leaders lack. Emotional smarts allows leaders to communicate effectively, relate well and resolve problems when they arise. Develop your child's emotional intelligence by encouraging them to tune in to and regulate their own emotions, and tune into the emotions of others. Help them see behind the behaviour of others and discover the emotions that may be driving behaviour. For instance, a sibling's aggressive behaviour may be driven by anger, annoyance or even sadness.

In closing

Leadership thinking requires kids to be accountable for their actions, plan ahead rather than act rashly, be open to working with others, and to tune into their own emotions and the emotions of those around them. These are mindsets worth nurturing using the tools of modelling, overt teaching (particularly with secondary school students) and providing plenty of descriptive, encouraging feedback.
