Devotional Thought

Which voice do people listen to?

So he reasoned in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons ... And they took him and brought him to the Areopagus, saying, 'May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting? For you bring some strange things to our ears. We wish to know therefore what these things mean' (Acts 17:17,19,20). Read Acts 17:16-34

Technology has brought an unlimited amount of information to us. Even if it were possible to draw a line in the sand and stop any more ever being added to the existing amount of news, stories, background information and possible new ideas, it has been cited several times that it would still take several lifetimes to read and absorb what's out there.

So, where does Jesus fit in? Our world is overflowing with news, ideas and stories. And now, with 'fake news', it's even harder to distinguish between what's real and what's not. No wonder people are confused. It's no wonder people throw their hands in the air, and in their attempts for peace and quiet from all the noise and news, even Jesus gets pushed aside. We need help to know which voice to listen

While Paul was in Athens, he noticed a whole bunch of idols and among them one to 'An Unknown God'. And he also had conversations with people who would do nothing but talk about the latest ideas or bit of news. Only an astute evangelist would seize such a moment to talk about Jesus and who this 'unknown God' really was.

For Paul, speaking about Jesus and unpacking the Scriptures was what he was commissioned to do. It is what he lived for. The gospel took him places. The gospel enabled him to meet some very influential people (Governor Felix, high priests and King Agrippa, to name a few) and influence them, too, with the good news of Jesus as Saviour and Lord.

But undergirding his missionary efforts was prayer. No doubt, before he entered a new region, city or town, his endeavours would have been immersed in prayer, asking for the Holy Spirit to lead and guide him to the right people so he could have the right conversations so that Jesus would be heard.

Try limiting the voices you listen to and focus on God's word in that space. Be pleasantly surprised at what God might be saying to you as the Spirit speaks truth into your life.

Holy Spirit, please go before me into my day and conversations so I may speak your truth and enable Jesus to be heard. Amen.


We had a fun morning out in Get 'em Going today! We learnt all about the plane.

Getting Along With Siblings

If the sounds of "He hit me!" or "She's hogging the TV!" are echoing through your home, you're not alone. Sibling rivalry is as common as vegemite sandwiches in households with multiple kids. Sure, having an only child might guarantee peace and quiet, but most of us are raising a whole crew, navigating the inevitable clashes that come with it.

But here's the thing: some squabbling is perfectly normal. It's how kids learn to share, compromise, and stand up for themselves. However, it's crucial to know when those playful tugs-of-war cross the line into something more hurtful.

So, how do you tell the difference between everyday bickering and behaviour that needs parental intervention? Here are some questions to consider:

- **1. Is it one-sided?** If one child consistently hurts, manipulates, or excludes the other, it might be a sign of bullying. Look for patterns of aggression, teasing, or control, especially if the targeted child isn't instigating the conflict.
- **2. What's the motive?** Are the children fighting over typical kid stuff like toys or attention, or is one sibling intentionally trying to hurt or humiliate the other? If the motive is malicious, it's crucial to address the behaviour promptly.
- **3. How old are they?** Young children are still developing conflict resolution skills, so some immature behaviour is expected. However, as they grow, you can teach them healthier ways to express their emotions and resolve disputes.

If you suspect your child is bullying a sibling, here are some steps you can take:

- **1. Model respectful behaviour.** Children learn by watching their parents. Demonstrate calm and respectful communication, even when dealing with conflict.
- **2. Spend quality time with each child.** Unmet needs for attention and connection can fuel misbehaviour. Dedicate individual time to each child to strengthen your bond and make them feel secure.
- **3. Encourage perspective-taking.** Perspective is the root of empathy (and empathy is the key to conflict resolution!). Ask questions like, "How do you think your sister felt when you said that?" or "What could you have done differently?" As they see the impact they have on others (and vice versa), they feel empathy and make changes that are much longer lasting than changes that are forced upon them by powerful parents.
- **4. Teach conflict resolution skills.** Equip your children with tools to resolve disagreements peacefully. This could involve teaching them to take turns, compromise, or use "I" statements to express their feelings.
- **5. Seek professional help if needed.** If the bullying persists or escalates, don't hesitate to seek guidance from a therapist or counsellor who specialises in children's behaviour.

Remember, some sibling conflict is normal and even healthy. It provides opportunities for children to learn important social and emotional skills. However, by addressing bullying behaviour early on and teaching healthy conflict resolution strategies, you can create a more peaceful and supportive environment for your children to thrive.

Year 5/6 Class Presented Their Class Book to the Nhill RSL & Historical Society






Congratulations to the 5/6 class on their special Book Week event - reading their Pte W. H. Miles story book for an audience of the Year2-4 classes, some parents, a grandparent, staff and two representatives of each of the Nhill Returned Services League and Nhill and District Historical Society. Students can be proud of capably reading pages they had illustrated in the story, while their drawings were projected behind them. They had completed the book earlier in the year.

The book is the history of an ANZAC from the Winiam community, who died the day after World War 1 ended. Mrs Clark had written the story, from historical information from the RSL, Historical Society and the web, to help students know one local man who gave his life and for whom we say 'Lest we forget'. The contribution of this small community at Winiam that had 22 volunteers serve in the Great War, seemed like a story that had been forgotten and deserved some memory.

The audience was fortunate to hear from Mr Rhys Webb about the role of the RSL and some of the memorials in this town, before the reading

began.
